Wholly Frijoles originated 12 years ago when Juan Gonzalez, tired of working in the corporate service industry, decided he wanted to own a food truck. He knew two things going into this new adventure: the need for more authentic flavors in Mexican cuisine across Northeast Ohio and his desire to be his own boss. While driving with his kids one day, pondering names for the soon-to-be food truck, Juan's oldest son exclaimed, "Wholly Frijoles!" (pronounced 'Holy Free-ho-lays'), and he knew immediately that's the name that would make dreams into reality.

Over the course of a long, exhausting year, Juan spent every Sunday building his food truck to perfection. He knew a positive attitude and a great truck wasn't all he would need to succeed, though. He started doing research into existing Cleveland-area food trucks and soon became part of the ever-growing food truck community that we know today.

Research didn't stop there! Juan also traveled to Mexico to learn more about authentic street food and how to bring those flavors to life in the North. During the first year of operation in 2013, Gonzalez's plan of attack was to reach out to existing large corporations and hospitals in order to get his food in front of as many people as possible. He was confident in his food and just needed to find the mouths to feed.

By the third year, the Wholly Frijoles Mexican Street Food Truck started to become a well-known name. Communities all over Northeast Ohio appreciated and respected the fact that Juan had the only Mexican Cuisine Truck that employed

Mexicans. Although being a Mexican family-owned operation, they proudly hire anyone willing to learn and have a wide variety of people employed.

Soon Gonzalez and his crew were able to buy a second truck in order to bring Mexican Street Food to as many people as possible. Over the years, the trucks have worked all kinds of events such as graduations, weddings, birthdays, festivals, and the newer Cleveland Food Truck Parks. However, one event that Juan puts at the top of his list is Cleveland's Pride Festival that takes place in June. The amount of business is just as rewarding as all the people they get to meet. Pride CLE will be an event that you'll see Wholly Frijoles at for the foreseeable future!

But peak food truck season is restricted to warm weather months and Juan wanted to be able to provide his unique food year-round! A space became available in 2020 in Cuyahoga Falls and the wheels in this businessman's mind started spinning immediately. Less than a year later filled with blood, sweat, and tears, the sought-after food truck had its first brick and mortar restaurant on State Road. It was small but mighty, offering just three tables for seating inside, but a nice patio to enjoy during the summer. There was certainly no struggle to maintain the authenticity of the flavors and food-truck style food thanks to the standards and practices Juan took so much pride in.

By the second year the restaurant was open, they had more than doubled their sales and now offered multiple ways to order, including DoorDash, UberEats, and GrubHub. Juan saw his business thriving and knew he couldn't stop there. His dream has always been to open five restaurants, and recently he got to claim his second brick and mortar location here in Macedonia. After the location was confirmed, it took just two short months and hours of hard work to create a very colorful space featuring Mexican artwork, custom flooring and counters, a much bigger dining area and the same amazing food that's existed for years.

What does this restaurant have that every other Mexican restaurant doesn't? In addition to slicing their own meats and making all the marinades and salsas themselves, one of the items that make Wholly Frijoles special is the Street Corn Fries. The dish starts with seasoned French fries and is topped with street corn, bacon, cilantro, and lime on the side. Along with quite a few other specialty dishes, the restaurants also feature street food classics such as street tacos, tortas, quesadillas, burritos and more! You get to choose from sides of their homemade salsa verde, salsa roja, or salsa habanero with almost every dish, all three varying in spice levels. There's certainly something for everyone here.

Gonzalez has no plans of slowing down, and it's easy to picture continuing success when he has a team of long-time friends and trusted employees who have the same vision. Juan is very open about the fact that he would not be able to succeed without his team, specifically his business partner and friend, Jorge Gutierrez. Jorge is Juan's right-hand man when it comes to anything in the kitchen at both locations as well as the food trucks. Gonzalez also gets to spend a lot more time at home these days with his family thanks to Jorge and their two managers; Jackie Anspach at the Falls location and Ashley Gavel at the Macedonia location. Together they all work to ensure that the Wholly Frijoles name is one that's recognized and enjoyed for days, months, and years to come! Juan and the team are so grateful to be a part of the Macedonia community and they look forward to seeing you soon!

All meetings are currently being held in person in council chambers, unless council has decided to hold a virtual meeting due to a weather or health emergency.



Golden Link Blvd Re-Surfacing

Asphalt re-surfacing of Golden Link Boulevard, within the shopping center, is now complete. The City of Macedonia, in conjunction with our partner Northfield Center Township, has received a grant from the Ohio Public Works Commission in the amount of \$144,500, for the re-surfacing of Golden Link Boulevard.

Valley View Road Re-Surfacing

Asphalt re-surfacing of Valley View Road, from Twinsburg Road south to the Macedonia City Limits, is currently underway. The City of Macedonia has received a grant from the AMATS in the amount of \$292,000, for this project.

As Fire Prevention Week approaches, the Macedonia Fire Department reminds residents:

"Cooking safety starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire prevention."

OCTOBER 9th – 13th — The Macedonia Fire Department is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®) — the official sponsor of Fire Prevention WeekTM for more than 100 years — to promote this year's FPW campaign, "Cooking safety starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire preventionTM." The campaign works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take when cooking to keep themselves and those around them safe.

According to NFPA, cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries in the United States. Unattended cooking is the leading cause of cooking fires and deaths.

"Year after year, cooking remains the leading cause of home fires by far, accounting for half (49 percent) of all U.S. home fires," said Lorraine Carli, vice president of outreach and advocacy at NFPA. "These numbers tell us that there is still much work to do when it comes to better educating the public about ways to stay safe when cooking."

The Macedonia Fire Department encourages all residents to embrace the 2023 Fire Prevention Week theme, "Cooking safety starts with YOU," said Assistant Chief, Paul Celinksi. "A cooking fire can grow quickly. I have seen many homes damaged and people injured by fires that could easily have been prevented."

The Macedonia Fire Department offers these key safety tips to help reduce the risk of a cooking fire.

- 1. Watch what you heat. Always keep a close eye on what you are cooking. Set a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- 2. Turn pot handles toward the back of the stove. Always keep a lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner.
- 3. Have a "kid- and pet-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 meter) around the stove or grill and anywhere else hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

Key Safety Tips

- Always use cooking equipment—air fryers, slow cookers, electric skillets, hot plates, griddles, etc.—that are listed by a
 qualified testing laboratory.
- · Follow the manufacturer's instructions on where and how to use appliances.
- · Remember to unplug all appliances when not in use.
- Check cords regularly for damage. Do not use any appliance with a damaged cord.

Slow Cooker

A slow cooker is designed to be left on while you do other things, even things outside of the home. However, there are few safety tips to keep in mind:

- · Keep things that could catch fire away from the slow cooker.
- Make sure the slow cooker is in a place where it won't get bumped. If the lid gets dislodged, the liquid could boil away, which could cause the appliance to overheat and create a fire.

Pressure Cooker

A pressure cooker is designed to cook food faster than a stovetop or oven. Because it uses hot steam and pressure to cook food it is important that they are used properly to prevent burns.

- · Place the cooker in an open space to give enough room for the steam to ventilate.
- Never cover the steam release valve on the pressure cooker.
- Do not leave the home when using a pressure cooker.

Air Fryers

- Give your air fryer enough space. The air vents release heat and need airflow.
- · Do not leave the home when using the air fryer.
- Make sure you clean grease and food debris after every use. Unplug and allow to cool completely before cleaning.

Hot Plate, Griddle and Electric Skillet

- · Stay with the hot plate, griddle, or electric skillet when cooking.
- Do not touch the surface of a hot plate, griddle, or electric skillet, as it could burn you.
- Unplug a hot plate, griddle, or electric skillet when not in use and before cleaning.
 Allow the appliance to cool before cleaning it.




Turkey fryers that use oil and an open flame cannot be used safely. These fryers use a large quantity of cooking oil at hot temperatures, which can lead to devastating burns.

Buy an infrared fryer or electric turkey fryer that has been listed by a qualified testing laboratory. Do not leave fryers unattended when in use.

Cooking brings family and friends together, provides an outlet for creativity and can be relaxing. But did you know that cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries? By following a few safety tips you can prevent these fires.

"COOK WITH CAUTION"


- Be on alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol don't use the stove or stovetop.
- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains — away from your stovetop.

If you have a small (grease) cooking fire and decide to fight the fire...

- On the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled.
- For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

If you have any doubt about fighting a small fire...

- Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire.
- Call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number from outside the home.



Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 metre) around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.


When to stop for a school bus in Ohio

On a road with fewer than four lanes, all traffic approaching a stopped school bus from either direction must stop at least 10 feet from the front or rear of the bus and remain stopped until the bus begins to move or the bus driver signals motorists to proceed.






If the bus is stopped on a street with four or more lanes, only traffic proceeding in the same direction as the bus must stop.

Failure to stop for a school bus adds 2 points to your license in Ohio and is punishable by fines up to \$500. You must appear in court and the judge has the discretion to suspend your driver's license for up to one year. A driver who injures a pedestrian while failing to comply with school bus safety laws can face both criminal charges and civil liability. Those liabilities can include the victim's medical expenses, lost wages, rehabilitation, and non-economic damages, such as pain and suffering.

School bus traffic laws are in effect for the safety of children or other passengers entering or leaving a school bus. Children often will be crossing the street at the bus stop, so these laws are extremely important for their safety. In Ohio, school bus traffic laws vary depending on the size of the road.

Two-Lane Roads

For two-lane roads, all traffic must stop for a school bus no matter which direction it's traveling. Traffic must stop at least 10 feet away from the school bus, whether coming from its front or rear.

Resuming Travels

In many states, traffic may resume when the school bus lights are off. In Ohio, traffic can't commence until the bus resumes movement or until it's waved on by the school bus driver. Other personnel who are allowed to move on traffic when a school bus is stopped include peace officers and school crossing guards.

School bus traffic laws are listed in the Ohio Revised Code, the law book for the State of Ohio. You can find traffic rules about stopping for school buses in Ohio Revised Code Section 4511.75.

Highways with Four or More Lanes

On roads with four or more lanes, only traffic moving in the same direction as the bus must stop when the school bus stops to release passengers. Traffic coming from the opposite direction doesn't have to stop in these instances. To facilitate this law, children are dropped off on the same side of the road as their residences, so they won't have to cross the street.

Divided Highways

Divided highways are treated the same as those with four or more lanes. Oncoming traffic doesn't have to stop regardless of how many lanes of traffic there are, but traffic moving in the same direction still has to stop. Traffic must stop no less than 10 feet away from the school bus

Waiting for a Stopped School Bus


The wait for a stopped school bus may seem to take a while in some cases. That's because according to Ohio law, the bus driver must wait to resume its travels until all exiting passengers are a safe distance away from the bus.

School Bus Safety Requirements for Traffic

A school bus doesn't have to be equipped with an extending stop safety sign in order for traffic to stop. When bus lights are flashing, this is sufficient to signal drivers that they need to stop, as the bus is loading or unloading passengers. The amber and red visual signals required for a school bus are listed in Ohio Revised Code Section 4511.771.

Violation of School Bus Traffic Laws

Those who violate school bus traffic stop laws may receive a \$500 fine and could have their driver's license suspended for no longer than listed in Ohio Revised Code Section 4510.02, which describes the lengths and classes of suspensions. Those who violate school bus traffic laws can't plead guilty on the site, but must attend a court hearing in person.





As fall sets in, the Department of Public Service will soon be heading into Leaf Collection. The leaves are beautiful, the weather is perfect, and what better way to spend our weekends than raking and blowing leaves. A few things to keep in mind as we put our leaves to the curb. Always keep the leaves out of storm drains and out of the curb gutter. If it remains to be as rainy as this year has been so far, we want to be sure we are not causing flooding issues with our leaf piles. A great place to

put your leaves is always on the tree lawn. The tree lawn is the area between the curb and the sidewalk. Storing leaves on the grass for a short time, even up to a few weeks, will not kill the grass. The grass may look somewhat discolored, but the color will come back quickly. If possible, we would prefer it if you could not park in front of leaf piles, as it makes it quite difficult for our leaf crews. We will either be forced to rake around the cars or in some cases skip the piles all together. Always check the Macedonia website for updates on dates for leaf season and any other Public Service information.

Snow season is also around the corner and will be here before we know it. As always there are a few reminders when it comes to plowing. Always be cautious driving around snowplow trucks, it is often difficult for them to see you. Stay back and give your snowplow driver at least 100 feet of room. Check your mailbox and make sure it is sturdy and in working order. Oftentimes, snow is heavy and can impact mailboxes.
